Comments (under 200 words) As a resident of Pasadena, I am deeply disappointed in the CAP and its implementation reports. Climate change is an existential crisis and our local response should be our highest priority. However, the “actions” listed in the CAP are vague, the time framework for implementation is too long, and the responses of the Planning Department and PWP are weak. It’s as if someone has shouted “FIRE” in a crowded theatre and the response

of the management is to block the doors and offer candy, drinks and popcorn and future ticket discounts.

We can't leave the theatre. We live here. We need effective and urgent action. I ask that the EAC send the latest report back to the City without giving it the imprimatur of community approval. Instead, the EAC should request the City to: a.) revise the CAP's "actions" to make them specific and measurable; b.) add actions that are missing (e.g. coal free energy, waste recycling, rooftop solar incentives; and c.) implement them without further delay.

Comments (under 200 words) Hello,
I wanted to say I found the Climate Action Plan somewhat depressing. I understand it was what was politically possible, but it falls far short of what is needed.

We are increasingly likely to breach 1.5°C by 2025, the current unprecedented droughts, floods, and parade of category 4-5 hurricanes that have devastated America over the past couple of years, are the result of only a bit over 1°C warming, there is a decades long delay between action and seeing it's impact on the Earth.

To stabilize the climate greenhouse gas concentrations need to stop increasing. If we do not achieve that, global warming will continue to worsen.

To stabilize the climate at 2°C it is estimated we would need to cut emissions by a bit over 10% per year over the next 10 years. The March global COVID19 shutdown achieved a temporary 8% cut, to actually stabilize the climate we need those emission cuts to be permanent—and to find 9 more years of cuts of a similar magnitude.

We are currently on track for 3-4°C warming depending how well countries implement their voluntary Paris accord cuts.

This not a time for timid climate plans.
